FROM THE GALLERY DIRECTOR

The new year brings with it a fantastic exhibition and public program line-up at Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery.

A key feature of the gallery's ongoing program is the development and presentation of outstanding exhibitions of contemporary art, craft and design supported by meaningful education and public programs – 2014 will be no different.

During the first part of the year, we are pleased to be hosting two national touring exhibitions, *WOOD: art design architecture* from the JamFactory and *Chris Langlois: Points in Time* from Manly Art Gallery & Museum with Gippsland Art Gallery. Both promise to be as engaging as they are beautiful.

Our annual *First Class* project, this year curated by Ann Caddey and Belinda Howden, celebrates the artistic achievements of our young artists by presenting selected 2013 Higher School Certificate artworks from Hunter and Central Coast schools.

As an adjunct to the *First Class* project, we have established an annual 'case study' featuring a key contemporary Australian artist. After the success of last year's *Anne Zahalka: a case study*, in 2014 we are proud to present the work of another artist with strong ties to the gallery, Janet Laurence. The exhibition will be specifically curated for secondary school students and be accompanied by a comprehensive education resource written by Kate Caddey.

Your collection highlight will be a selection of the work by the photographer Charles Collin (1896-1982). In 1990, the Newcastle Photographic Society generously donated a large number of works made by the artist between 1930 and the 1960s. Although, as a collection, these rich silver gelatin prints document many local sites, events and people, for this exhibition Rob Cleworth has selected photographs that focus on architecture and industry to complement *WOOD*.

We continue to work on two significant Aboriginal projects with the Aboriginal Reference Group: the first is the next phase of *Birabahn (and Thelkeld)* funded by Arts NSW, and the second is an Aboriginal Emerging Leadership Program in four regional galleries across the state, funded by the Federal Office of the Arts and Arts NSW.

Alongside exhibitions and projects, the gallery will be presenting a host of public engagement programs and events, many supported by the Gallery Society, as well as loads of education programs. This year began with a new intensive summer school for artists and our ever-popular holiday workshops for children. These have been followed by a host of new term art classes for children and adults alike, run by skilled tutors. Check our website for details.

During 2013, over 31,000 people visited the gallery, 1,500 of them being school students. With the addition of a new Marketing and Audience Engagement Officer to the team, we look forward to seeing many more visitors this year.

Over the coming months, we look forward to welcoming you all to the Hunter's only waterfront gallery, where there is something for everyone.

WOOD: art design architecture

WOOD represents a cross-section of current creative practices, modes of thinking and relationships to this fundamental material through a unique selection of furniture and functional objects, sculptural works (including wood carving by Indigenous artists), interiors and architectural work.

Co-curated by Brian Parkes and Elliot Rich, the exhibition looks at the use of wood through three lenses: place and identity, sustainability and ecology, craftsmanship and technology. While the exhibition focuses on Australian works and projects, the publication and associated events position those works in a dynamic international context.

WOOD: art design architecture is a JamFactory and Botanic Gardens of Adelaide touring exhibition.

Your Collection: Charles Collin

In 1990, the Newcastle Photographic Society gifted Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery over 90 photographs by Charles Collin (1896-1982). The photographer, who spent much of his working life (1936 to 1963) with the Australian Broken Hill Proprietary Co Ltd Steelworks (BHP), Newcastle, produced a rich body of evocative and engaging silver gelatin photographs. The works featured in *Your Collection: Charles Collin* look back at an important period in the history of Newcastle and the Hunter region, and document the works and workers of BHP and the port of Newcastle.

Now in its sixth year, *First Class* is an established annual exhibition project celebrating the high calibre of work produced by students from the Hunter and Central Coast regions. The exhibition is selected from nominated Higher School Certificate submissions produced in the previous year. In 2014, the selected artworks investigate power in all its forms from the personal to the global.

In late 2013 the gallery launched a new initiative to showcase secondary school photomedia projects, with the first being a portrait exhibition by Whitebridge High School Year 11 students. All exhibitions are proudly displayed in our education facility to publicly acknowledge the accomplishments of local students and their teachers.

Janet Laurence: a case study



Chris Langlois: Points in Time

Chris Langlois studied in Newcastle and maintains a strong relationship with the Lower Hunter. He is now one of Australia's leading contemporary landscape artists, renowned for his rigorous technique and powerful imagery.

While inspired by place, Langlois' paintings often transcend time and location to tap into personal experience and the emotions. Co-curated by Katherine Roberts of Manly Art Gallery & Museum and Simon Gregg of Gippsland Art Gallery, this exhibition explores the artist's career over the past ten years.


Where we are

Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery is located at the north-west end of Lake Macquarie amidst five hectares of lakefront grounds and sculpture park. The gallery has a carpark adjacent to Hunter Rowing Club, but can be reached via the cycleway, the lake or public transport. Catch a train to Booragul Station and enjoy a 15-minute walk down Fourth Street into First Street and along the waterfront; or alight at Fassifern or Teralba Stations and catch a bus or taxi/hire car. If driving from Sydney, take the Toronto exit on the M1 Pacific Motorway. Turn left at Toronto Road (signposted Newcastle) and turn right at the roundabout at Booragul. Continue along First Street to the end. Google Maps: search for 'Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery'.
